The chart displays the mid-monthly total volume over a four-year period. The y-axis represents the volume, ranging from 10 to 210 in increments of 20. The x-axis shows time in 6-month intervals from December 2021 to December 2025. The volume starts at 90 in December 2021, rises to a peak of approximately 175 in early 2023, then drops sharply to around 55 by mid-2023. It remains relatively stable between 50 and 70 until late 2024, when it rises to about 115, before declining again to its lowest point of approximately 48 in early 2025, and ending at 85 in December 2025.

This data has not been seasonally adjusted. Sometimes seasonal adjustment is used to remove fluctuations in unemployment and labor force trends that normally occur with changes in the season. Seasonal variation in employment occurs for natural and institutional reasons, including reduced employment involving outdoor activities during winter, changes in labor force and unemployment levels with opening and closing of schools, and layoffs during the automobile model changeover period. Seasonal variations can also affect the number of online job ads, so over the year it will affect the data in this report.
