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Ohio Job Outlook to 2030

Overview

Employment projections are a key product of the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services' Bureau of Labor Market Information. The bureau completes 10-year employment projections every two years and two-year employment projections annually. The projections are based on the most current data available at the time they are made; they are estimates of future employment assuming there are no changes in the current situation. People who use this information include individuals planning their education, training, and careers; educational program planners developing training courses and curricula; administrators and legislators responsible for government policies; and business executives planning marketing and personnel strategies.

One key use of the long-term employment projections is in the identification of Ohio Top Jobs. Statistical thresholds for wage, growth, and annual openings determine the baseline list of occupations used. The list of Top Jobs is for operational and implementation purposes, specifically to foster cross-agency alignment and to better target job matching and career planning services through **OhioMeansJobs.com**.

This report presents Ohio employment projections from 2020 to 2030. It is divided into three sections. The "Ohio Population Trends" section presents population projections and historical labor force participation rates. The "Ohio Industry Employment" section presents employment projections for Ohio's goods-producing and service-providing industries. The "Ohio Occupational Employment" section presents employment projections for occupations and occupational groups.

Overall, the Ohio economy is expected to add 257,000 additional jobs between 2020 and 2030, with an expected 641,000 job openings annually. The health care and social assistance services industry is expected to add the most jobs, and a large portion of job growth will come from health care occupations. Read more to learn about the growth expectations for Ohio's industries and occupations.

Ohio Population Trends




Figure 1. Population Growth as a Percentage from 1990

Historically, Ohio's population has grown more slowly than the national average. As shown in Figure 1, Ohio's population grew 8.5% from 1990 to 2021 while the U.S. population grew 32.8%. From 2000 to 2021, the national population grew 17.6% while Ohio's population grew 3.7%.

Ohio's slower-than-average growth is expected to continue (Figure 2). Projected 10-year population growth rates for the U.S. are 7.4%, with the projected working age population (age 16 and older) expected to grow at a rate of 8.5%. In comparison, Ohio's total population is expected to grow 0.3% in 10 years, and the working-age population will see 0.5% growth. The oldest population group (65 and older) is expected to grow 31.3% for the entire U.S. and is expected to increase by 18.4% in Ohio. However, the 25-to-64 age group is expected to decline in Ohio by 5.5% and is expected to increase nationally by 2.8%.

Even though the total and working-age populations in Ohio have been growing, labor force participation rates have been declining. This means fewer people in the working-age population are working or actively looking for work. In Late 2006 through early 2007, , the labor force participation rate for Ohio peaked at 67.7%; by 2020 it had dropped to 61.8%.




Figure 3. Ohio Labor Force Participation Rates by Gender - 2000 to 2020

Figure 3 shows the labor force participation rates for men, women, and the total working-age population from 2000 to 2020.


The decline in labor force participation is part of a national trend. At first glance, it appears recent recessions may have caused steep declines in participation rates. During these recessions, some individuals were discouraged and stopped looking for work, which means they were no longer part of the labor force. Many of these individuals rejoined the labor force as the economy recovered. Other factors are driving the decline in labor force participation. The strongest factor, one that began at the height of the recession, was the beginning of retirements for the baby boom generation. In 2008, the first of the baby boomers turned 62 and became eligible for Social Security; in 2011, they turned 65. Nationally, about 10,000 baby boomers turn 65 each day.² Even though they have retired, they are still part of the working age population. If they are not employed and not actively looking for work, they count against the labor force participation rate. Continuing retirements among the baby boomers will push labor force participation rates lower.

A second factor affecting participation rates is an overall decline in labor force participation among many demographic groups. For example, labor force participation among prime-age men (ages 25 to 54) has continued to decline for nearly 70 years since 1954.³ Figure 4 shows the percentage of those 65 and older in the working-age population projected to 2030.

Ohio Industry Employment

This section shows projected employment changes for a variety of industry classifications. Business establishments are classified into industries according to the primary goods and services they produce or provide, using the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). For example, factories assembling cars are classified in the motor vehicle manufacturing industry, and supermarkets are in the grocery store industry. See Appendix Table A for examples of types of businesses by NAICS classification. NAICS has several levels of classification, each giving a more detailed picture of each industry. This report presents industry employment projections at the NAICS sector and industry-group levels to illustrate expected changes.⁴

Industry Sectors

Industries typically are grouped in two broad categories: goods-producing, which produce physical products, and service-providing, which are all other industries. The goods-producing industry sectors are agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting; mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction; construction; and manufacturing. The service-providing industry sectors are wholesale trade; retail trade; transportation and warehousing; utilities; information; finance and insurance; real estate and rental and leasing; professional, scientific, and technical services⁵; management of companies and enterprises; administrative and support and waste management and remediation services⁶; educational services; health care and social assistance; arts, entertainment, and recreation; accommodation and food services; other services (except public administration); and government.




Figure 5. Ohio Industry Employment Outlook

Figure 5 details employment projections for goods-producing and service-providing industries. Overall, the number of jobs for Ohioans is expected to rise from 5.567 million in 2020 to 5.824 million by 2030, an increase of more than 257,000 jobs. Service-providing industries are expected to add 257,257 jobs, an increase of 6.0%. Goods-producing industries are expected to add 13,281 jobs, an increase of 1.4%.

Figure 6 shows the employment change expected for each industry sector between 2020 and 2030. Service-providing industries are denoted by a dark red bar; goods-producing industries have a blue bar. Among the goods-producing sectors, construction is projected to grow by 10,061 jobs, and manufacturing is projected to shrink by 2,575 jobs. Growth among the service-providing sectors will be led by the health care and social assistance industry, which is expected to add more than 86,000 jobs, a 10.6% increase. The accommodation and food services industry is expected to add more than 64,000 jobs. The transportation and warehousing industry, as well as educational services, are expected to add more than 27,000 and 24,000 jobs respectively. However, retail trade is expected to shrink by more than 18,000 jobs. See Appendix Table B for industry projections by absolute and percent change.

High-Growth Industry Groups: Within the sectors are industry groups of related industries; these industry groups within sectors can change in different ways. Figure 7 shows the 10 industry groups expected to grow the fastest from 2020 to 2030. Each is expected to grow between 34.8 and 82.5%.

The fastest-growing industry group is projected to be the charter bus industry (NAICS 4855), with an increase of 82.5%. This industry group is in the transportation and warehousing sector. Three other fastest-growing industry groups are also in that sector: other transit and ground passenger transportation (NAICS 4859), with a 63.7% increase; scenic and sightseeing transportation, land (NAICS 4871), with a 62.9% increase; and school and employee bus transportation (NAICS 4854) with a 34.8% increase.

The arts, entertainment, and recreation sector also has four industry groups represented in the fastest-growing list, as they rebound from pandemic-related losses. These industries include promoters of performing arts, sports, and similar events (NAICS 7113), with an increase of 67.8%; amusement parks and arcades (NAICS 7131), with an increase of 54.7%; independent artists, writers, and performers (NAICS 7115), with an increase of 48.1%; and museums, historical sites, and similar institutions (NAICS 7121), with an increase of 36.6%. Most New Jobs: Although some industry groups are expected to experience high rates of job growth, the groups themselves may be small and, therefore, offer a smaller number of jobs. By the same token, large industry groups with lower expected percentage growths may offer a large number of additional jobs. This is illustrated in Figure 8 by restaurants and other eating places (NAICS 7225). This industry group employed nearly 354,000 workers in 2020; it is expected to add more than 54,000 new jobs by 2030, a 15.4% increase. By contrast, individual and family services (NAICS 6241), which employed more than 62,000 workers in 2020, is expected to add more than 20,000 jobs by 2030, a 32.3% increase.

The 10 industry groups projected to add the most new jobs are shown in Figure 8; they are expected to add 156,004, or 60.6%, of new jobs by 2030. See Appendix Table D for a complete list of the top 30 private-sector industries with the most new jobs.

Ohio Occupational Employment

The employment outlook for individual occupations is affected by the industries that employ them. Some occupations, such as registered nurses, tire builders, and structural iron workers, are highly concentrated in a few industries; demand for those occupations depends on the health of those industries. Other occupations, such as secretaries and computer systems analysts, are present in many industries; demand for those occupations is more closely tied to changes in the economy. Changes in technology, business practices, and operations affect how employers structure staffing to improve productivity. For example, technological advances will continue to reduce the need for such occupations as telephone operators, typists, travel agents, and order clerks.

Understanding the employment outlook of occupations is important for career planning. As some occupations are expected to grow and others are expected to shrink, Ohio developed a list of Top Jobs occupations to assist in career planning. Along with other information, the employment outlook of occupations provides the baseline data for the Top Jobs list using statistical thresholds for wages, annual openings, and growth. The Top Jobs list is available and utilized throughout **OhioMeansJobs.com** to better target job matching and career planning services provided on the website. This section presents the job outlook in Ohio by type of work and required education and training levels.

Occupations are classified using the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system, which has 22 groups of occupations with related types of work. For example, one occupational group consists of managerial occupations. Within each occupational group are specific occupations, each with different requirements for knowledge, skills, abilities, and duties. Occupations are classified at the six-digit SOC level. See Appendix Table F for a comprehensive look at occupational projections by occupational group.

Ohio is expected to add 257,000 jobs from 2020 to 2030, but perhaps more important to individuals searching for jobs is the expected number of annual job openings. On average, Ohio's economy is expected to have over 641,000 job openings annually. Over 4% of annual job openings will result from the creation of new jobs. About 38% of annual job openings will result from the need to replace workers who leave the labor force, usually upon retirement; the remaining 58% of openings will result from the need to replace workers who switch occupations.

The data in this report was compiled and analyzed during the COVID-19 pandemic. (See Data Limitations on page 19 for more information.)

Fastest-Growing Occupational Groups: Figure 9 shows the projected fastest-growing occupational groups. Healthcare support occupations are expected to grow the most, at 14.5%. The next-fastest growing occupational group is food preparation and serving related, at 13.2%. See Appendix Table G for a list of Ohio's fastest-growing occupations.

Occupational Groups with the Most New Jobs: As with industries, fast-growing occupational groups may be relatively small and may not add as many new jobs as larger groups that are growing more slowly. The food preparation and serving related occupational group is expected to add 56,597 jobs. Over two out of every 10 new jobs will be in the food preparation and serving related occupational group. Figure 10 shows the major occupational groups ranked in terms of number of jobs.

Occupations with the Most Annual Openings: New job growth is one component of occupational demand, but needs arising from transfers out of occupations and exits from the labor force result in a larger number of job openings. About 96% of the job openings from 2020 to 2030 are expected to result from the need to replace workers who leave the labor force or switch occupations. Even shrinking occupations have replacement needs, and they may provide substantial opportunities for employment.

Figure 11 shows the top 10 occupations with the most projected annual openings. Of the top 10, fast food and counter workers (SOC 35-3023) leads with an expected 34,067 annual openings. Rounding out the top five are retail salespersons (SOC 41-2031); laborers and freight, stock, and material movers, hand (SOC 53-7062); cashiers (SOC 41-2011); and stockers and order fillers (SOC 53-7065).

Self-Employment: The number of self-employed individuals varies widely by occupation.

Appendix Table I provides a list of the 58 occupations that have at least 1,000 self-employed workers. The self-employed percentages range from 1.0% for laborers and freight, stock, and material movers, hand (SOC 53-7062) to 70.6% for psychologist, all other (SOC 19-3039).

Figure 12 shows occupations in which more than half the people employed in that occupation are self-employed.

Education and Training: Each occupation has typical education levels associated with it, although in practice workers in an occupation may have a range of educational experience. Some occupations have specific requirements associated with licensure or certification. Knowledge of the typical education level associated with an occupation can be useful for career planning and job seeking.

Figure 13 shows the distribution of jobs by their typical education level in 2020. That year, over 62% of all jobs had a typical education level of a high school diploma or less. About 38% of jobs had a typical education level of some form of post-secondary education, which could be anything from a certificate to an advanced degree. Over 26% of jobs had a bachelor's degree or higher as a typical education.




Figure 14. Projected Net Job Growth by Education Level, 2020-2030

Figure 14 shows projected net job growth by education level. About 46% of the net job growth from 2020 to 2030 is expected to be in occupations typically associated with a high school diploma or less. Fifty-four percent of net job growth is anticipated in occupations typically associated with some form of post-secondary education. A predicted 42% of job growth will be in occupations typically associated with a bachelor's degree or higher.




Figure 15. Estimated Annual Job Openings by Education Level, 2020-2030

An anticipated 70.2% of annual job openings will be in occupations associated with a high school diploma or less. See Figure 15.

Technical Notes

The Ohio long-term industry and occupational forecasts were derived primarily from data produced by the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) and the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) programs. The forecasts were funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL).

Industry Employment Forecasts

The forecasting models utilized a historical monthly employment series from the QCEW program data through December 2018. Industry groups with three- or four-digit North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes were chosen. Industry employment projections were made at the four-digit NAICS industry level using a variety of models, including single-equation regression models. These models related Ohio industry employment to national industry employment and other key economic determinants for Ohio, especially income and population.

Occupational Employment Forecasts

Occupational estimates were derived from an industry-occupation matrix. From a three-year OES survey cycle, industry staffing patterns were generated based on the Standard Occupational Classification coding structure. Occupational patterns for work arrangements outside the scope of the OES program (including agriculture, private household, self-employed and unpaid family workers) were developed using U.S. national staffing patterns and U.S. Census of Agriculture information.

Wages

The median wage estimates were produced using OES data, which are based on a semiannual mail survey. The survey gathers employment and wage data for specific occupations by geographic area and industry. Statewide Ohio wages were used when available.

Annual Openings

To project occupational openings, Ohio uses national separation rates calculated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics caused by workers exiting the labor force due to retirement or other reasons (labor force exits) and separations caused by workers transferring to different occupations (occupational transfers). Projections of separations are combined with projections of employment change to determine occupational openings.

Educational and Training Classifications

DOL's educational and training classification system consists of three categories: (1) typical education needed for entry, (2) commonly required work experience in related occupations, and (3) typical on-the-job training needed to obtain competency in the occupation. Data Limitations

Every effort was made to ensure the accuracy of the projections, but data and forecasts are subject to error. The information in this report is best used as an indicator of employment trends, not as an exact count or prediction. It should be used in combination with other data sources and information. While every attempt is made to incorporate current and near-future events – such as business closings, corporate layoffs, openings, and expansions – it's not possible to know everything that might happen. Events that may take place after the projection period or announcements concerning closings, layoffs, openings, and expansions known after projections were completed are not reflected in the forecasts. Also, legislative policy could cause employment to change. Events such as these will likely cause the actual employment numbers to vary significantly from these projections. This report provides estimates

of the number of jobs, not the number of employees. It makes no distinctions for employment characteristics such as full-time, part-time, or secondary jobs.
